## FDEP provides Checklist for issuance of Orders

This article is intended to provide our customers with some helpful background information when preparing documents for submittal to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) or the Broward County Local Program (BC). Often, when reports are submitted to BC, they include recommendations which require us to generate paperwork for submittal to FDEP so that they may issue Orders, such as Natural Attenuation Monitoring (NAM) Orders, Remedial Action Plan (RAP) Orders, or Site Rehabilitation Completion Orders (SRCO). The information required to generate these Orders includes technical (project) information as well as administrative information.

Some of the administrative information (names, addresses, corporate information, email addresses, etc.) required includes property owner information, in addition to the Responsible Party (RP) – i.e. the company or individual tasked with assessment and remediation. In many cases, and for a variety of reasons (lease agreements, contractual obligations, ownership of liability, etc.), the property owner may not be the same person, or the same entity, as the RP. In most instances, the FDEP requires Orders to be mailed to the property owner, even if they are not directly involved in the assessment and remediation. For this reason, it is important that report submittals document the relationship between interested parties, when applicable, so that we may provide better information to the FDEP. To that end, some of the administrative points of the checklist are provided below:

- Verify that the facility name, property owner's name, address, discharge date(s), discharge priority score and eligibility match the information in the State databases.
- Use the county property appraiser's website to verify that you have the current property owner information. If the facility site address information or the property owner's name or address needs to be updated in State databases, send an updated Tank Registration form to TankRegistration@dep.state.fl.us.

Most of the key technical information required for Orders pertains to SRCOs. SRCOs require that some technical (project) information be attached to it, such as tables and figures illustrating the contaminants identified at a particular facility. Over the past few years, BC has been working with the FDEP to clarify what should be included with this backup documentation and how it needs to be presented. It is important to note that adequate backup documentation must be provided before the FDEP will issue an SRCO, which may lead to unnecessary and frustrating delays. Listed below are some of the key points that have required the most attention recently:

For SRCOs, provide a facility map and tables with applicable water and soil analytical data as per the May 14, 2007 BPSS <u>Quality Assurance and Related Issues</u> memorandum. Include the following footnotes on tables, as applicable, for the following situations (they can be handwritten):

- o November 17, 2011 DWM <u>Rounding Analytical Data for Site</u> Rehabilitation Completion memorandum.
- October 12, 2004 FDEP <u>Guidance for the Selection of Analytical</u> <u>Methods and for the Evaluation of Method Detection Limits and</u> Practical Quantitation Limits.
- Facility map and tables have the facility name and Facility ID number and match State databases.
- Data showing that the site / facility is clean for at least two consecutive sampling events of representative monitoring wells, performed a minimum of 3 months apart as per No Further Action criteria in subsection 62-770.680(1), Florida Administrative Code.\*
- If multiple discharges exist at the facility, and some monitoring wells
  will continue to be used, specify which wells will be abandoned and
  which wells are going to be kept until the SRCO is issued for the
  other discharges.
- If applicable, include the <u>Benzo(a)Pyrene Conversion Table</u> for carcinogenic PAHs in soil.
- If applicable, provide a figure showing the final excavation boundaries and the analytical data showing that the area is clean.

\*BC note – often, during the life of a project, monitoring wells are abandoned and replaced, and confirmatory soil borings are installed (often using different identification for the replaced and confirmed locations). In this instance, it is important to explain in the text of the report, and on the tables and figures, how the data are related.

Some additional technical information:

• Be sure to reference the version of Chapter 62-770, FAC that pertains to the discharge (should be 2005 for most cases).
