





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CHAPTER 1 — INTRODUCTION

It is the policy of Danz Contracting, LLC to provide a safe and non-discriminatory workplace for its employees. To this end, the company, in concert with employees, will seek to comply with all applicable standards promulgated pursuant to the Occupational Safety and Health Act OSHA. Any employee may obtain a copy of the referenced standards by contacting the company safety representative.

Since the most important component of any safety policy or program is implementation, it is our intent to communicate the contents of this program to our employees. In turn, all employees are expected to comply with this document and will be disciplined if found to be in non-compliance.

As a member of Danz Contracting, LLC, each employee makes a commitment and is held accountable to their safety performance. Danz is committed to eliminating jobsite injuries and has adopted a Zero Injury Process

Zero Injury Process simply stated means, every accident is preventable.

When a worker has an injury, it effects the people close to them, their family. Zero injuries mean going home to your family every day in the same physical condition you reported to work, this is the philosophy, this is the reason to have Zero Injuries.

CHAPTER 2 – DISCIPLINARY POLICY

Danz Contracting, LLC is committed to providing its employees with a safe and healthy environment to work in. To this end we have adopted the philosophy of the Zero Injury Process as presented in the introduction of the Safety, Health and Employment Practices Manual.

With acceptance of employment with Danz, you have acknowledged your understanding of the Zero Injury Philosophy and obligation to work by and obey all rules, programs and policies established by Danz. All employees should immediately report policy violations or safety hazards to a member of the Danz management staff. The achievement of this goal depends upon the positive actions and attitudes of the employee and their willingness to contribute to an overall effort by Danz as a whole.

Most often, employee conduct that warrants discipline results from unacceptable behavior, poor performance or violation of the Danz policies, practices or procedures. However, discipline may be issued for conduct that falls outside of those identified areas. Equally important, Danz need not resort to progressive discipline, but may take whatever action it deems necessary to address the issue at hand, including termination. This may mean that more or less severe discipline is imposed in a given situation. Violations of different rules may be considered the same as repeat violations of the same rule for purposes of progressive action.

Danz management will normally adhere to the following progressive disciplinary process. Management includes any of the following personnel: Field Supervisor, Project Manager, Safety Office, Vice President or President.

DISCIPLINARY POLICY FIELD, CREW AND SHOP EMPLOYEES

1. Verbal Warning: An employee will be given a verbal warning when a problem is identified that justifies a verbal warning or the employee engages in unacceptable behavior as determined by Management. All verbal warnings issued by Field Supervisors may be discussed with the Project Manager for possible action.
2. Written Warning: A written warning is more serious than a verbal warning. A written warning will be given when an employee engages in conduct that justifies a written warning or the employee engages in unacceptable behavior as determined by a supervisor. Written Warnings - The preferred method is to complete an EMPLOYEE SAFETY VIOLATION NOTICE. However, a written warning may be documented in the field or shop area on a separate sheet of paper, discussed with the employee, and sent to and reviewed by the appropriate Danz Vice President.
3. Suspension: A suspension is more serious than a written warning. An employee will be suspended when he or she engages in conduct that justifies a suspension or the employee engages in unacceptable behavior. An employee's suspension will be documented and, regardless of the length of the suspension issued, will remain in the employees personnel file for the length of employment.
4. Termination: An employee will be terminated when he or she engages in conduct that justifies termination or does not correct the matter that resulted in less sever discipline as determined by management. Prior written notice to an employee is not required for termination of employment.

DISCIPLINARY POLICY FIELD SUPERVISION

1. Verbal Warning: A Field Supervisor will be given a verbal warning when a problem is identified that justifies a verbal warning or the employee engages in unacceptable behavior as determined by Management.
2. Written Warning: A written warning is more serious than a verbal warning. A written warning will be given when a field supervisor engages in conduct that justifies a written warning. Written warnings are in letter form and maintained in an employee's personnel file. Written warnings may include forfeiture of bonuses at the discretion of Danz President.
3. Suspension: A suspension is more serious than a written warning. A Field Supervisor will be suspended when he or she engages in conduct that justifies a suspension or the employee engages in unacceptable behavior. Suspension documentation is maintained in an employee's personnel file. Suspensions may include forfeiture of bonuses, and termination of employment at the discretion of Danz President. IDLH Suspension: Management may suspend and remove any Field Supervisor involved in, contributing to or causing a condition IMMEDIATELY DANGEROUS TO LIFE and HEALTH at any time during a site inspection.
4. Termination: An employee will be terminated when he or she engages in conduct that justifies termination or does not correct the matter that resulted in less sever discipline as determined by Management. Prior written notice to an employee is not required for termination of employment.

OSHA Citations (General) – Occupation Safety and Health Administration Citations

A written warning will be given when a Field Supervisor engages in conduct or is found responsible for an OSHA citation that has proven the Field Supervisor engaged in unacceptable behavior causing the citation (The citation could be for other than serious or a serious citation). Written warnings are maintained in an employee’s personnel file. Written warnings may include forfeiture of bonuses at the discretion of DC President. Timing of disciplinary action will depend on the severity of the potential citation and/or the eventual outcome of the OSHA citation process.

OSHA Citations (Willful Citations) – Occupation Safety and Health Administration

A suspension will be given when a Field Supervisor engages in conduct or is found responsible for an OSHA willful citation that has proven the Field Supervisor engaged in unacceptable behavior causing the citation. A willful citation is automatically considered unacceptable behavior. Supervisors found responsible for willful citations will face possible termination, or suspension, of employment and forfeiture of bonuses at the discretion of the DC President. Timing of disciplinary action will depend on the severity of the potential citation and/ or the eventual outcome of the OSHA citation process.

Danz Contracting, LLC. will generally take disciplinary action in a progressive manner. However, DC reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to decide whether and what disciplinary action will be taken in a given situation.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND PERSONAL INJURY POLICY

As part of the Safety and Health Program, it is the policy of Danz Contracting, LLC to make certain that all employees have been instructed as to the proper procedures in case of an emergency or injury.

If you are injured and your injury results in lost time from work an accident review team will be assembled within 10 days of the accident to make sure the injured employee is recovering and to fully understand the causes of the accident. The team will consist of the Project Manager, Project Supervisor, Risk Management Committee and the injured employee.

- Danz Contracting, LLC designates the 911 systems as its first response in the event of any emergency.
- For your benefit, to protect your interest, all injuries, no matter how small, must be reported immediately to your supervisor.
- Initial treatment for all injuries must take place by a physician approved by the Company Safety and Health Coordinator.

CHAPTER 3 — ACCIDENT PREVENTION PROGRAM

INTRODUCTION

With the employee’s participation, it is the goal of Danz Contracting, LLC to provide a workplace free from recognized hazards that may cause or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm to employees.

Danz Contracting, LLC has appointed a company representative as the Safety Coordinator who is responsible for the implementation of the Safety and Health policies. Additionally, each work site Supervisor is the designated employee responsible to oversee and implement the Safety and Health policies at the work place. Through a cooperative effort between the employee, their supervisor and the company Safety Coordinator, it is the intent that these policies will be an effective means to provide a safe work environment.

Employees are encouraged to routinely read and understand these policies and to be actively involved in monitoring the job site for safety concerns. Individuals should work with their Supervisor concerning any issues and questions they may have.

Following is a series of basic rules that have been adopted by Danz Contracting, LLC as the foundation of the program. They are not inclusive and are subject to change as need arises. Review them carefully and incorporate their use into your daily work.

be advised, your involvement and cooperation in this regard is expected as a condition of your employment with Danz Contracting, LLC.

PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT RULES

It is the policy of Danz Contracting, LLC to strictly enforce the following rules for the personal protection of its employees. Violations are subject to discipline as outlined in Chapter 2 of this manual.

- **HARD HATS:** Hard hats are to be worn when working under an overhead exposure.
- **SAFETY VEST:** Safety vests that are fluorescent in color and visible at 360 degrees through the full range of body motions, day and night must always be worn on any Danz Contracting, LLC project site. While an individual is confined to the operator’s seat of the equipment; or, the cab of a vehicle a safety vest is not required, however, when the individual is no longer confined to the operator’s seat of the equipment, a safety vest must be put on.
- **FACE and EYE Protection:** Use of face and eye protection is always encouraged. Protection is mandatory where a hazard or risk of injury exists from flying objects or particles, harmful contacts, exposures, or a combination of these hazards.
- **FOOT Protection:** All employees are always required to wear leather work boots in good condition on any Danz Contracting, LLC site.

- **HAND Protection:** Use of proper hand protection is mandatory where a hazard or risk of injury exists from harmful contacts, exposures, or a combination of these hazards.
- **CLOTHING Protection:** Employees are encouraged to wear clothing conducive to their work assignment in regard to durability and protection. Jewelry of all kinds is discouraged for safety reasons. Hair should be groomed tight to the head to avoid any possible contact with tools and moving objects. Full-length pants and shirts with shoulders completely covered are mandatory.

TRAFFIC REGULATOR RULES

Traffic safety in construction zones is an integral and high priority element of every project from planning through design and construction to the responsibilities of the Traffic Regulator. Following are specific safety principals applicable to anyone who at any time is engaged in regulating traffic on any project. It is the responsibility of the project supervisor to make certain that all required traffic control devices are in place prior to implementing the assignment of a Traffic Regulator.

- All Traffic Regulators will be trained and certified by the Danz Contracting, LLC company representative, to the standards set forth by the Florida Department of Transportation.
- Hardhats must be worn at all times on any Danz project sites.
- Safety vests that are fluorescent in color and is visible at 360 degrees through the full range of body motions, day and night must be worn at all times on any Danz Contracting, LLC project site.
- All traffic regulators will use a six-foot staff octagonal combination STOP – SLOW sign to control traffic.

6-FOOT FALL PROTECTION RULES

Danz Contracting, LLC requires compliance with 1926 Subpart M of the OSHA Standards governing fall protection whenever the walking working surface where working duties are being performed has an unprotected side or surface which is six feet or more above a lower level.

Each work site Supervisor must determine whether the walking working surfaces requires fall protection.

SITUATIONS requiring the use of fall protection may be, but not limited to:

- Workers constructing or working near leading edges
- Workers on the face of formwork or reinforcing steel
- Workers on the edge of excavations
- Workers in the area of open structures, pits, shafts and vaults

METHODS of protection from falling are, but not limited to;

- Use of guardrails
- Nets
- Fall arrest systems

MANHOLES that do not exceed 39 inches above a walking working surface must be provided with a cover marked with the word HOLE or COVER to provide warning of the hazard; and the cover must be strong enough to support the maximum intended load and secured in place to prevent displacement.

EXCAVATION RULES 5-FOOT AND DEEPER

Danz Contracting, LLC requires compliance with 1926 Subpart P of the OSHA Standards governing Excavation, Trenching and Shoring. An excavation means any man-made cavity or depression in the earth's surface formed by earth removal. The sides of an excavation more than five feet deep shall have a protective system in place. A qualified employee shall design a support system and approve any changes made to the system. The design of the support system shall be maintained at the jobsite.

- Forms of protective systems may be, but not limited to:
- Excavated to the appropriate angle of repose
- Shoring
- Benching
- Shielding
- Trench box
- Any combination of the above When adjacent to traveled roadways, barrier

No one shall enter an excavation prior to approval by the worksite Supervisor.

Straight or extension ladders must be placed within 25 feet of an employee working in an excavation, must be secured and extend three feet above the top of the excavation.

Excavated and other material must be stored no closer than two feet from the edge of the excavation.

All employees working in excavations must always stay within the protective system.

Never climb on shoring, trench sides or sloped walls.

PROTECTION OF OPEN EXCAVATIONS AND HAZARDS RULE

It should be every crew's objective not to leave any open excavations or other hazards at the end of the work. We all understand this is often not possible with on-going pipe installation and/or manhole construction, or other excavations that must be left open for a period of time.

OSHA Subpart P of the standard contains language-requiring protection of excavations and or hazards. In this regard Danz Contracting, LLC has adopted the following rules:

- When at all possible, backfill all excavations as the work progress.
- If the excavation must be left open or a hazard cannot be removed, it is mandatory that protective fencing be installed around the entire perimeter of the excavation or hazard.
- Protective fencing must be a minimum of 48" high, 6 foot back from the edge of the excavation and installed with sufficient post to prevent the unintended intrusion of an individual.
- When adjacent to traveled roadways, barrier must be used to prevent errant vehicles from entering the excavation.

HAND TOOL RULES

Hand tools are covered in OSHA 1926 Subpart I Tools – Hand and Power. Danz Contracting, LLC has a responsibility to provide training in the use of all tools and to maintain the tools to provide safe operation.

Consequently, do not operate any tools you have not previously demonstrated a proficiency in its use or been trained to use. Do not operate any tool that is not in safe working condition.

Listed below, but not limited to, are some of the more important rules concerning use of hand tools:

- Use of personal protective equipment is mandatory as described elsewhere in this manual. All defective tools shall be reported to your supervisor immediately and removed from service.
- Do not use tools for any purpose other than its designed or approved use.
- Do not remove or alter any safety device or guard on tools.
- Prior to operation inspect all tools, any defects shall be reported to your supervisor and the tool removed from service.
- Operators of powder-actuated tools must have a current and valid operator's card.
- Systems operating pneumatic tools shall have safety fasteners at all connections between tools and hose lines and at all quick make-up type connections to prevent accidental disengagement.

MOTORIZED NON-LICENSED EQUIPMENT RULES

Operation of lifting and digging equipment is governed by 1926 Subpart CC of the OSHA Standards and is incorporated as a part of this rule. Danz Contracting, LLC expects all operations and use of the referenced equipment will comply.

Listed below, but not limited to, are some of the more specific rules governing operation of equipment:

- Only designated individuals will be permitted to operate or service lifting and digging equipment.

- No employee is permitted to ride on any part of any equipment unless the equipment manufacturer provides a passenger seat as part of the equipment.
- It is the responsibility of all employees to make certain that back-up alarms on all equipment are in an operable condition. Equipment may not be used if alarms are found inoperable. Notify your supervisor immediately if you discover a faulty or defective alarm. Notification should also be given to the Equipment Superintendent in the shop if possible.
- Perform daily inspections, more frequent if necessary, and report all maintenance and operations issues to your supervisor including any broken glass and or shields that are damaged or missing.
- All hoisting equipment must have a legible lift chart either printed directly on the machine or in a book/paper form inside the cab of the machine. Operation of the equipment outside the permitted parameters of the lift chart is not permitted. Additionally, all hoisting equipment must have an annual inspection form attached inside the cab.
- Rotating equipment with "pinch points" used in a stationary position must have its swing radius roped off and guarded per 1926.959 of the OSHA Standard.
- Maintain a minimum 10-foot distance from all energized lines; use a spotter in difficult areas. High voltage lines may require more than a 10-foot distance, consult your supervisor if there is any question concerning the safe isolation distance.
- Direction to operators of equipment must be given by use of approved hand signals. know and understand these signals and remain in a position where the operator can clearly see you. For your convenience a chart of approved hand signals follows.

ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT RULES

Electrical equipment is covered in 1926 Subpart K of the OSHA Standard. Danz Contracting, LLC is exposed to electrical issues extending from generator and pumping operations to the use of extension cords for hand tools. Listed below, but not limited to, are the more specific rules related to electrical equipment and installations:

Only qualified individuals can operate, maintain and repair electrical equipment. This includes, generators, welders, pumps and electric tools.

- Ground fault indicators should be checked for proper operation at the beginning of each shift. If the ground Fault is inoperable, the electric equipment should not be used, and reported to your supervisor.
- All frayed, cut or stretched extension cords should be taken out of service and returned to the shop for repair.
- All electric powered tools must be operated from an electrical system protected with a ground Fault circuit Interrupter.
- Hot work of any kind is prohibited. Always shut down the electrical equipment before servicing, repairing or investigating questionable function.

AERIAL WORK PLATFORM RULES

Aerial work platforms are defined as; “an entire device that is designed and manufactured to raise personnel to an elevated work position on a platform supported by scissors, masts, or booms.”

1926.453 of the OSHA Standard governs aerial work platforms and their operations. Subsequently, Danz Contracting, LLC mandates all operations and use of aerial platforms be done per the OSHA Standards.

Listed below but not limited to, are some of the more specific rules governing aerial work platforms:

- Employees who have been trained and issued a permit to use the specific equipment may only operate aerial work platforms. Permits issued from other employers are not valid for use at Danz Contracting, LLC
- All occupants of boom or mast type aerial work platforms must use a harness with lanyard attached to the appropriate points on the platform. Scissor type platforms do not require the use of a lanyard.
- Never stand on rails or scaffolds to achieve additional working height.
- Maintain prescribed (at a minimum 10') clearance from all electrical lines.

SCAFFOLDING RULES

Danz Contracting, LLC policy is that all scaffolds will be constructed, installed and used in compliance with Subpart L – Scaffolds of the OSHA Standards.

A scaffold is defined as any “temporary elevated platform which is supported or suspended, including its supporting system and points of anchorage, and which is used for supporting an employee or materials, or both.”

Fabrication, installation and use of a scaffold should only be done with the prior approval and knowledge of your supervisor.

Listed below but not limited to, be some of the more specific rules governing scaffolding.

- Scaffolding should only be erected under the direction of a qualified employee.
- Keep all scaffolding free from excess tools, materials and debris.
- All scaffolding 6' or higher must have a guardrail system installed on any open side.
- Remove from service any wood or laminated planks in poor condition, along with any bent scaffolding members.
- Maintain a 6' clearance from energized lines.
- A fall arrest device must be worn when working on a scaffold at or above 10'.

RIGGING RULES

This rule pertains to the handling and storage of construction materials and is governed by 1926 Subpart H of the OSHA Standards.

Wire rope slings, nylon or synthetic slings, ropes and chains are all used in some variation to handle materials. Proper use of this rigging equipment is a must in order to avoid life threatening accidents and other injuries. by nature of its use, this equipment is subject to accelerated wear and tear and often used improperly.

Listed below are some basic rules regarding rigging equipment.

- A qualified employee who is familiar with Subpart H of the OSHA Standard shall inspect before each job and at the beginning of each shift rigging equipment. Defective rigging equipment must be removed from service. broken wires in wire rope, kinks, abrasion and unraveling are all signs of excessive wear and require immediate inspection from a qualified individual with reference to Subpart H of the Standard.
- Know the safe working loads of all rigging equipment you plan to use. Rigging data is available for your use.
- Rigging equipment shall not be used in any manor other than its intended purpose and rated capacity.
- Natural or Synthetic rigging shall not be used if it is frozen, subjected to corrosive chemicals, extreme heat or distressed as described above.
- Hooks, shackles and other accessories should be taken out of service if there is any sign of distortion, excessive wear or faulty safety latches.
- All chains must have a permanently affixed tag showing the size, grade, rated capacity and the manufacturers name.
- Do not tamper with, alter or modify safety latches and avoid use of the equipment if the safety latches are inoperable or damaged.

WELDING AND CUTTING RULES

This rule is designed to provide reasonable safety to employees involved in, or exposed to, welding operations and is governed by Subpart J of the OSHA Standards.

Basic rules are but not limited to:

Always wear the appropriate personal protective equipment when welding or cutting;

- Gloves
- Aprons
- Leggings
- Goggles, shield or safety glasses

Always use backflow devices on gas and oxygen hoses.

Never weld or cut without proper ventilation.

Store full and empty cylinder containers in the designated storage areas.

PILE DRIVING RULES

Pile driving is inherently some of the most dangerous work we do at Danz Contracting, LLC. Almost all aspects of safety are involved with the work from equipment operation to use of slings and the 6-foot fall protection rule.

Pile driving is covered partially in 1926.603 of the OSHA Standards.

Listed below, but not limited to, are some of the specific rules pertaining to the pile-driving function.

- All hose connections to the pile driver hammer, pile extractor, or jet pipes shall be securely attached with an adequate length of cable on hoses to prevent whipping if the joint is broken.
- Hanging or fixed leads shall have fixed ladders.
- Employees are prohibited from remaining on the leads or ladder while piles are driven.
- Aloft workers must always use personal protective equipment and must be properly tied-off.
- Hoisting of piling shall be done by use of a closed shackle
- Man-lifts or a ladder shall be used to lace sheet pile.
- Hearing protection required.
- Eye protection is recommended.
- Fire extinguishers required.

BORING RULES

Safety issues concerning personnel working inside a bore casing are covered in 1926.800 of the OSHA Standards - Underground Construction

Specific rules applicable to boring operations are, but not limited to:

- The atmosphere of the casing to be entered will be tested for oxygen deficiency and gaseous conditions prior to entry and continuously during the period of occupancy.
- If an employee is required to enter a casing less than 3 feet in diameter, a lifeline for instant rescue shall be securely fastened to the ankles. Another employee shall be stationed at the casing entrance to operate the lifeline.
- Approved ventilation with an airline shall be provided in the casing.

WORKING OVER OR NEAR WATER RULES

Personal Protective Equipment covered in Part 1926.28 off the OSHA Standards addresses safety precautions that must be taken when working near water and the possibility of drowning exists.

Basic rules are but not limited to:

- An employee working over or adjacent to water shall wear an U.S. Coast guard approved life jacket or buoyant work vest designed to roll the wearer face up, if unconscious. Prior to use, the life jacket shall be inspected for defects; defective units shall not be used.
- A ring buoy with not less than 90 feet of safety line shall be provided and shall be readily available for rescue operations.
- Not less than 1 lifesaving boat equipped with a method of propulsion that is effective for the water conditions shall be available at the location where an employee works over or adjacent to water.

CHAPTER 4 — CONFINED SPACE PROGRAM

1. CONFINED SPACE DEFINITION

Confined space means any space having a limited means of entry and exit, which may be subject to the accumulation of toxic or flammable contaminants or may have an oxygen deficient atmosphere. Confined or enclosed spaces include, but are not limited to, storage tanks, process vessels, bins, boilers, ventilation or exhaust ducts, sewers underground utility vaults, tunnels, pipelines, manholes, gate wells, catch basins and open spaces more than 4 feet in depth such as pits, tubs, vaults, and vessels.

2. TRAINING EMPLOYEES

All employees required to enter a confined space shall be instructed as to the nature of the hazards involved, the necessary precautions to be taken, and in the use of protective and emergency equipment required. The company shall comply with any specific regulations that apply to work in a confined space.

3. TESTING AIR QUALITY

The atmosphere of the confined space to be entered will be tested for oxygen deficiency and gaseous conditions, which are possible in the confined space. The results of the testing will be recorded and meet the guidelines set up by OSHA. In testing the air quality in a confined space, the minimally acceptable reparable atmosphere will be as follows;

Oxygen: 19.5% Combustible gas: 5% of the lower explosive limit for each gas

The testing of a confined space will be done by a positive type-reading instrument before entry and will be recorded before entry into the space. A qualified person who has been trained in the testing, operation and calibration procedures will do the testing.

4. VENTILATION

When necessary to assure air quality, proper ventilation will be put into effect to allow entry into the confined space. If natural ventilation is not adequate, ventilation equipment will be used to maintain respirable atmosphere in the confined space during the time employees are inside.

5. SAFETY AND EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT

Air monitoring devices will be on site and will be calibrated by trained personnel. These devices will be able to monitor oxygen deficient atmosphere, toxic, or combustible gases.

If local emergency units are not readily available, safety and emergency equipment will be on site and ready to use at the confined space.

6. GENERAL SAFETY CONCERNS

If ventilating a confined space opening interferes with vehicular traffic, appropriate warning signs and protective barriers shall be set up before the covers of manholes, hand holes, or vaults are removed. The wording of a warning sign would depend upon the nature and the location of the hazards involved. Before an employee enters a street opening such as a manhole, it shall be protected with a barrier, temporary cover, or other suitable guard.

If circumstances dictate that the company employees perform rescue procedures, means shall be provided for quick removal of employees. When a safety harness and lifeline are used, they should be properly attached to the employee so that their body cannot become lodged in the exit opening.

A reserve employee with a pre-plan rescue procedure shall always be stationed outside the entrance to the confined space to observe or communicate with the employee(s). The reserve employee shall be trained and equipped to initiate a rescue operation. It should be realized that a single person could seldom raise an unconscious body without a mechanical device. This rule is interpreted to mean that without such a device, additional personnel must be within summoning distance. It is also interpreted to have available approved self-contained breathing apparatus or escape type airline respirators for the additional personnel who may have to enter the confined space.

The above written procedures are guidelines for Danz Contractors, LLC and their employees who are required to enter into a confined space. All other rules that are not covered in this procedure shall be governed by the OSHA confined space entry procedures.

CHAPTER 5 — HAZARD COMMUNICATION PROGRAM

YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO KNOW

Under the provisions of the employee's right to know laws, you can obtain information on substances and agents in the workplace including:

1. The identity of any substance or agent you work with or to which you are likely to be exposed.
2. A description of the hazardous effects of the substance or infectious agent.
3. Precautions to be taken when handling the substance.
4. Emergency treatment procedures in the event of overexposure to the substance or agent.

If you would like additional information on the employee's right to know law or specific information on substances or agents in the workplace, contact the Vice President.

1. PROGRAM PURPOSE

This program is intended to help our employees become more aware of safety and health hazards associated with the chemicals and other substances supplied to and used in the workplace and why it is important that appropriate safety measures are followed for their health. This program will ensure that chemicals and hazardous substances present in the workplace are identified and labeled. Employees will have access to information on the chemicals and on how to prevent injuries and illness due to chemical exposure.

2. HAZARD DETERMINATION

Hazardous chemicals and substances are defined as any chemical or substance, which is a physical or health hazard to people.

Danz Contracting, LLC will rely upon the product manufacturers and suppliers to make the determination if their product is classified as hazardous and is subject to the provisions of the Hazard Communication Standard. Manufacturers and suppliers must provide Danz Contracting, LLC with current, correct and lawfully completed Safety Data Sheets for each product manufactured and, or sold. Manufacturers and suppliers must also label all containers of products pursuant to the law.

Through this procedure, Danz Contracting, LLC and its employees will be able to identify hazardous chemicals and substances and protect themselves from overexposure.

Each time a new chemical or hazardous substance is introduced into the workplace, its corresponding SDS must be reviewed thoroughly before the product can be used, before using such a product, the job supervisor will verify that the SDS has been reviewed.

3. SAFETY DATA SHEETS

The typical SDS is broken down into 8 sections identifying the following:

- A. Name, address and telephone number of the manufacturer that makes the product.
- B. The chemical name and the hazardous ingredients contained in the chemical.
- C. The physical and chemical characteristics of the chemical such as appearance and odor.
- D. The flash point and information regarding the fire extinguishing methods to be used.
- E. Lists the reactivity data and safe storage procedures.
- F. Lists the health hazards associated with the improper use of the chemical.
- G. Lists the precautions to be used for safe use and handling.
- H. Lists the control methods for protection yourself from overexposure and dangers of the chemical.

A complete inventory of SDS's for all chemicals and hazardous substances used will be maintained electronically via MSDSONline.com account. All supervisory personnel will have access.

4. PRODUCT LABELING

Danz Contracting, LLC relies on its suppliers to ensure that all chemicals and hazardous substances are properly labeled. If ever a product is decanted into a secondary container, the

Project Supervisor will affix a secondary label to that container. Product labels will contain the following information:

- A. Identity of the chemical or substance by name.
- B. Appropriate hazard warnings and precautions for safe use and handling.
- C. Name and address of the manufacturer or other responsible party.

5. EMPLOYEE TRAINING

Training will be conducted periodically and during the orientation of new employees. Training shall include:

- A. Understanding the Hazard Communication Program and the requirements of this program.
- B. Reading, interpreting and understanding a material safety data sheet and knowing where to find them and how they can obtain additional information.
- C. Reading, interpreting and understanding chemical and substance container labels.
- D. Methods by which employees can identify chemicals and the physical and health hazards they present.
- E. Measures which employees can take to protect themselves from chemical overexposure using safety equipment and alternate work practices.

6. COMMUNICATING HAZARDS TO OUTSIDE CONTRACTORS

Whenever a contractor's employees are on the project, it is the responsibility of their supervisor to inform them of any hazardous chemicals they may be exposed to and the location of the SDS's

7. EMPLOYEE RESPONSIBILITIES

A successful Hazard Communication Program includes the following responsibilities:

- A. Know that the law gives you the right to be informed of hazardous substances used in the workplace.
- B. Know and understand our Hazard Communication Program including attending all weekly safety meetings for training on this and other safety topics.
- C. Know where and how to get information about work site hazardous substances.
- D. Know how to read and understand material safety data sheets and labels.
- E. Learn and follow the proper safety procedures for using and handling hazardous substances including wearing necessary personal protective safety equipment as required by the program.
- F. Always follow all the safety requirements on all work sites.
- G. Cooperate with Danz Contracting, LLC in ways to improve this entire safety program to protect your health and safety.
- H. Do not work in unsafe conditions or perform unsafe acts.

CHAPTER 6 — LEAD ABATEMENT OPERATIONS

GENERAL

NIOSH and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) have recently

recommended that exposure to lead dust and fumes be minimized using engineering controls and work practices, and by the use of personal protective equipment (PPE) including respirators.

Workers are potentially exposed to lead during work on bridges or other steel structures such as water and fuel storage tanks. Workers who may be exposed to lead include abrasive blasters, inspectors, ironworkers, painters and laborers.

1. HEALTH EFFECTS

Lead can be absorbed into the body by inhalation (breathing) and ingestion (eating). Lead is a cumulative poison. It accumulates in the blood, bones and organs. Cumulative exposure to lead, which is typical in construction settings, may result in damage to the blood, nervous system, kidneys, bones, heart and reproductive system and contributes to high blood pressure.

A. The symptoms of lead poisoning include the following:

- a. Headache
- b. Poor appetite
- c. Dizziness
- d. Irritability/anxiety
- e. Constipation
- f. Pallor
- g. Excessive tiredness
- h. Numbness
- i. Metallic taste in mouth
- j. Muscle & joint pain or soreness
- k. Sleeplessness
- l. Hyperactivity
- m. Weakness
- n. Reproductive difficulties
- o. Nausea
- p. Fine Tremors
- q. Insomnia
- r. "Lead line" on gums
- s. "Wrist drop" weakness of extensor muscles

2. EMPLOYEE SAFETY PRACTICES FOR LEAD PROTECTION

A. Personal Hygiene Practices

- a. All workers exposed to lead should wash their hands and faces before eating, drinking or smoking, and they should not eat, drink, or use tobacco products in the work area.
- b. Contaminated work clothes should be removed before eating.
- c. Workers should change into work clothes at the worksite. Clothes should be stored separately from work clothes in a clean area. Workers should change back into their street clothes after washing or showering before leaving the worksite to prevent the accumulation of lead dust in the workers' cars and homes and thereby protect family members from exposure to lead.

- d. Personal vehicles taken to the worksite should be parked where they will not be contaminated with lead.

B. Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

- a. Protective clothing should be worn in order to minimize the accumulation of lead on the worker's skin and hair. Workers should change into work clothes immediately before entering the work area and change out of these clothes before leaving the jobsite.
- b. Employees are provided with a half mask respirator as protection against airborne lead concentrations.

3. ENGINEERING CONTROLS FOR LEAD PROTECTION

- A. Warning signs are to be used to mark the boundaries of lead contaminated work areas.
- B. Blood tests for lead level will be required on an annual basis of all employees at risk of being exposed to lead.
 - a. Blood lead levels of 1 to 49 are within the acceptable range.
 - b. Blood lead levels of 49 or above require a medical examination of worker and consultation.
 - c. Blood lead levels of 50 or above call for removal of worker from any job with potential lead exposure.
- C. Air monitoring will be performed at the worksite to determine:
 - a. Composition of the paint.
 - b. Measure worker exposure to airborne lead and other hazardous agents e.g., silica and solvents.
 - c. Select the engineering controls and PPE required.
- D. When performing abrasive blasting, scaling, chipping, grinding or other operations to remove lead-based coatings, all available work practices will be utilized in order to decrease air-borne lead dust and fumes (e.g. negative air, wet plastering, daily clean-up of lead-containing and abrasives).
- E. Workers will be trained/notified on the following topics as they relate to lead exposure:
 - a. Information about the potential adverse health effects of lead exposure.
 - b. Information about the early recognition of lead intoxication.
 - c. Instruction about heeding signs that mark the boundaries of lead-contaminated work areas.
 - d. Discussion of the importance of personal hygiene practices.
 - e. Instruction about the use and care of appropriate protective equipment.

4. SAFE WORK PRACTICES

- A. Use the exhaust ventilation system, where provided.
- B. Use the correct, clean respirator.
- C. Keep the worksite clean. use only a vacuum with a HEPA filter or wet cleaning methods when removing lead dust. Never use compressed air for cleaning.
- D. Eat, drink, or smoke in areas outside the worksite. keep all lunch boxes and coffee cups away from the work area. Use a separate lunchroom.
- E. Wash hands and face before eating, drinking, smoking or applying cosmetics.
- F. Use protective clothing. Store street clothes separately from work clothes. Never wear contaminated clothes home.

5. TRAINING

Construction standards, such as 29 CFR 1926.21 require that a potentially exposed employee be informed of the hazards of lead and be trained in the precautions to take when working around it. The employee shall also be instructed in proper work practices, personal equipment, such as eye and face protection, head protection, coveralls and respirators.

CHAPTER 7 — RESPIRATORY PROTECTION PLAN

1. APPLICATION

- A. This program will be available and implemented on a jobsite where a Danz Contracting, LLC employee wears a respiratory protective device.
- B. This program describes procedures required for selection and use of a respirator. Additional specific respiratory selection and use procedures may be necessary on jobsites where a comprehensive OSHA or other regulatory agency standards apply.

2. INTRODUCTION

- A. Human life depends on a continuous supply of breathable air. A person can live for weeks without food, days without water, but only minutes without oxygen. Air becomes unbreathable if its oxygen content is reduced too low or an excessive amount of an air contaminant is present. Air contaminants can interfere with the body's normal uptake of oxygen or can have other toxic effects.
- B. At each site for which an employee may be exposed above the Personal Exposure Limit (P.E.L.) to excessive concentrations of air contaminants, Danz Contracting, LLC uses feasible primary controls (i.e. mechanical ventilation and other engineering controls, work practices and administrative controls such as employee/job rotation schemes) as necessary to reduce and maintain employee exposure below the maximum allowed level.
- C. Where exposure conditions are so severe that primary controls cannot attain the level allowed, they are nevertheless used to reduce exposure as much as is feasible.

3. RESPIRATOR SELECTION

- A. Danz Contracting, LLC provides a variety of respirators; the type selected for use depends on a number of factors that include:
 - a. Physical, chemical and physiological characteristics of the air contaminants including odor warning property.
 - b. Amount or concentration of contaminants in the air.
 - c. Length of time employee must work in the contaminated air.
 - d. Potential for skin absorption of the contaminant.
 - e. Medical condition of the potentially exposed employee.
 - f. Respirator protection factor (RPF).
 - g. Comfort of the wearer.
 - h. Suitability of the respirator considering other safety requirements of the work or operation to be performed.
 - i. OSHA or other regulatory agency specifications.
 - j. Percent oxygen available in the atmosphere.

- B. Danz Contracting, LLC provides full-face piece respirators at the request of an employee such as for comfort or when necessary for skin or eye protection from workplace air contaminants, etc.
- C. The Project Superintendent will assure that cartridges used with an air-purifying respirator have been selected properly considering the contaminants that the respirator wearers are likely to encounter.
- D. Examples of proper selection include:
 - a. HEPA filters for routine protection against dusts that contain lead or other particulates having an OSHA PEL of 50 ug/m³ or less.
 - b. A dust mist, fume filter may be used for routine protection against general particulates such as dust from construction activities.

4. ISSUING RESPIRATORS

- A. A respirator will be provided for the exclusive, work-related use of the employee or other person to whom issued. Reusable respirators that are turned in by persons, who no longer need them or upon termination of employment may be reissued after required cleaning, disinfection, inspection and maintenance.
- B. Respirators are provided at no cost to the employee subject to the care and use requirements of this program.
- C. A respirator issued or used under our control, must meet the requirements of this program. Employees are not allowed to bring a respirator on site that wasn't issued by the company.
- D. The Project Superintendent assures that each person assigned work at the site knows who is responsible for issuing respirators and that respirator use is required under any following circumstances:
 - a. If an employee may be exposed to air contaminants at a concentration that exceeds a regulatory limit or a guideline limit of a recognized authority.
 - b. If an employee requests a respirator for health protection or safety purposes.
 - c. If brief, but very high contaminant concentrations are expected during maintenance or repair operations involving welding, etc.

5. TRAINING

- A. Prior to allowing a person to perform work requiring the use of a respirator on a jobsite covered by this program, the Project Superintendent determines whether the person has received training in accordance with the OSHA standard within the previous twelve months. Those who have not must receive the training specified in the standard before being allowed to perform the work.
- B. A training log is maintained at the office listing employee name, social security number and last date of successful completion for Respirator Training.
- C. A Certified Industrial Hygienist registered safety engineer, certified safety professional or other person(s) of like qualification supervises the Danz Contracting, LLC respirator training program provided in accordance with the OSHA Standard.

6. RESPIRATOR USE PROCEDURES

- A. An employee is not permitted to wear a tight-fitting respirator under conditions that interfere with the face-to-face piece seal or with the functioning of a respirator valve.
- B. Each time a respirator is put on the wearer must:
 - a. Check for contamination inside the respirator.
 - b. Check for obvious deficiencies such as loose or missing components, broken or badly worn straps, deteriorated sealing surfaces, etc.
 - c. Check that the cartridges and/or filters are in place and are appropriate for the contaminants likely to be encountered.
 - d. Adjust the straps for proper, comfortable fit.
 - e. Perform the negative and positive pressure checks on a tight-fitting face piece

QUALITATIVE FIT TEST PROCEDURES

A. Irritant Smoke Test:

- a. Stannic Chloride or Titanium Chloride smoke tubes are used to detect leaks. The smoke is highly irritating and causes the wearer to cough or sneeze. Puff a small amount of smoke into the air and allow the employees being fit tested to become familiar with very low airborne concentrations of this smoke. Note: the fit-tester must use great care not to cause the employees respiratory stress from this smoke.
- b. Install a high efficiency filter, or canister approved for the specific type of smoke to be used in the test, onto the respirator.
- c. Put the respirator on, and adjusts straps to fit your head and face comfortably.
- d. The tester will tell the wearer to close his/her eyes. The tester begins to lightly puff smoke about two feet from the respirator.
- e. The tester will note the wearer's expressions as smoke density is increased.
- f. When the smoke tube has been brought to within about six inches of the respirator with no leakage detected, the tester may direct smoke at potential leakage sources.
- g. The tester may ask the wearer to perform movements as described in the Isoamyl Acetate (banana oil) fit test procedure.
- h. If no leakage is detected, there is assumed to be a satisfactory seal.
- i. If leakage occurs, wearer must readjust the face piece, and steps d through h are repeated.

B. A quantitative fit test is required for:

- a. Negative pressure, full-face piece respirator used to protect against lead and must be repeated at least every six months.
- b. A tight-fitting respirator (any type) used to protect against cadmium and must be repeated at least annually.

- C. A written record is kept at the office of all fit tests performed. The record must have the approval of a certified industrial hygienist (CIH) or other person of like qualifications.

- D. Off shift storage must protect the respirator against dust, sunlight, heat, extreme cold, excessive moisture and damaging chemicals. Respirators are packed or stored so that the face piece and exhalation valve rest in a normal position to ensure that their function not be impaired by the elastomer setting in an abnormal way. This requirement normally cannot be met by storage in toolboxes unless special cartons, etc. are used. Routinely used respirators, such as dust respirators for example, may be stored in plastic bags.
- E. A respirator wearer is permitted to leave the hazardous area for any respirator-related cause that includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. Failure of the respirator to provide adequate protection.
 - b. Respirator malfunction.
 - c. Air contaminant leakage into the respirator.
 - d. Unacceptable increase of breathing resistance.
 - e. Severe discomfort or facial irritation.
 - f. Illness such as dizziness, nausea, breathing difficulty, excessive coughing or sneezing, vomiting, fever or chills.

F. The Project Superintendent assures that a compressor used to supply breathing air to an SAR is carefully located to avoid air inlet entertainment of contaminants (e.g. carbon monoxide from the exhaust of other internal combustion engines). The compressor must be equipped with filters, moisture traps, coolers, etc. as necessary to provide grade D or better breathing air.

No employee or agent is authorized to modify a respirator we use in such a manner as to void its NIOSH approval.

7. MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF RESPIRATORS

- A. Danz Contracting, LLC is guided by the respirator manufacturer’s manuals and by instructions that may be received from NIOSH and OSHA.
- B. Employees are individually responsible for the maintenance and care of respirators issued to them. This includes cleanliness and replacement as needed of filter cartridges, harnesses straps, peel away face shield covers and inhalation or exhalation valve diaphragms. A qualified person designated by the Project Superintendent may only perform repairs or replacements beyond these. A personally issued respirator should be cleaned at the end of each day that it is used. In the absence of specific instructions otherwise, cleaning is accomplished as follows:
 - a. Carefully inspect inhalation and exhalation valve assemblies.
 - b. Wash face piece and components in a solution of warm water and mild detergent or sanitizing powder.
 - c. Rinse all parts in clean, warm water.
 - d. Air dry in a clean area.
 - e. Reassemble (with new cartridges if necessary) and store properly.
- C. The Project Superintendent is responsible for respirators not issued to an individual employee. Cleaning and disinfection is necessary after each use of a respirator not individually assigned.

8. EMPLOYEE RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. As a user of respiratory equipment, you have the responsibilities of:
 - a. Using respiratory equipment per manufacturer’s instructions.
 - b. Guarding against damage to the respirator.
 - c. Go immediately to an area of “clean” air if your respirator malfunctions.
 - d. Report any malfunctioning of respirator equipment to your supervisor. (Includes discomfort, resistance to breathing, communication, and restriction of movement).
 - e. Do not wear respirators if facial hair comes between the sealing surface of face piece and the face or interferes with valve function.

9. RESPIRATORY USE GUIDELINES

The following is Danz Contracting, LLC Respiratory Protection Program. This will cover the selection, use, cleaning, storage and maintenance of half and full mask respirators.

A. Selection and Use

- a. Employees need to wear respirators because of lead contaminated dust. Danz Contracting, LLC will supply respirators to each employee. To make sure an employee has a proper fitting respirator, we have each employee given a Respirator FIT Test using the same type of respirators that are used on our jobsites. If the employee does not pass this test, we will supply a respirator from a different manufacturer and the employee will be tested again.
- b. Danz Contracting, LLC supplies a full-faced mask and a half-faced mask respirator.
- c. Airborne Concentration of Lead* Required Respirator

< 500 ug/m3	Half Faced Mask
< 2500 ug/m3	Full Faced Mask

B. Use

- a. A respirator is of no use to an employee if it is being used wrong. Each employee is taught the correct usage of each respirator at the FIT test.

C. Cleaning, Storage and Maintenance

- a. Keeping each respirator clean and working properly is extremely important. The respirator worn should be thoroughly washed with soap and water. They should be kept in a clean and safe place once cleaned.
- b. Each respirator should be frequently checked to make sure that all parts fit properly and that there is no damage to any of the parts. If when checking the respirator any part looks worn out, that part should be replaced. It is also important that if at any time it feels hard to breathe, replace the filter in the respirator immediately.
- c. The interior of the respirator must be maintained in a sanitary condition and cleaned as often as necessary with disinfectant to achieve this goal.
- d. Inspect respirators prior to each use and during cleaning, check for general appearance, face seals for tears, inhalation valves for tears or cracks and exhalation valves for the same.

On the issuance of a hurricane warning:

1. Continue coordination with the client agency as to status and progress of preparedness effort.
2. Insure all loose items in and around job site and staging areas are secure.
3. Eliminate all hazardous conditions to the greatest degree possible.
4. Insure backfill and restore all trenches, excavations and open holes at job site.

5. Finalize removal/security of all barricades, equipment and materials from/at job site.
6. Perform final inspection/walk-thru of work and storage areas with all sub-contractors before evacuating the project site.
7. Provide the client agency with a list of equipment available on site to support post-storm recovery efforts.
8. Evacuate all personnel from job site.

Upon return of normal weather conditions and re-establishment of job site access and approval from public safety agencies:

1. Remobilize personnel and equipment.
2. Coordinate with the client agency's departments to assist in the clearing of debris and securing of unsafe conditions.
3. Restore jobsite and perform damage assessment.

1.1.4. Management of Job Order dollar volume within bonding limitations of the Contractor.

1.1.5. Price, as it relates to the County's independent cost estimate or to an offer from any other contractor.

1.1.6. Contractor's responsiveness to the County on Job Orders.

1.1.7. Other appropriate criteria as deemed in the best interest of the County.

2. INITIATION OF A JOB ORDER

Upon completion of the joint scoping process, the County will prepare a draft Detailed Scope of Work referencing any sketches, drawings, photographs, and specifications required to document accurately the work to be accomplished. The Contractor shall review the Detailed Scope of Work and request any required changes or modifications. When an acceptable Detailed Scope of Work has been prepared, the County will issue a Request for Job Order Proposal that will require the Contractor to prepare a Job Order Proposal. The Detailed Scope of Work, unless modified by both the Contractor and the County, will be the basis on which the Contractor will develop its Job Order Proposal and the County will evaluate the same. If three quotes or bids cannot be obtained, the Contractor will provide the reason in writing for the County's approval. If approved, less than three quotes or bids will be allowed.
 - 3.4.3.3. The final price submitted for Non Pre-priced Tasks shall be

according to the following formula:

A = Hourly Labor Rate (for Trades not in the Construction Task Catalog®) x the Quantity required

B = Direct Material Costs (supported by three quotes)

C = Direct Equipment Costs (for Equipment not in the Construction Task Catalog®) x the Quantity required

D = Subcontractor Costs (supported by three quotes)

E = Allowable Overhead and Profit = (A + B + C) x 15%

F = Subcontractor Allowance = D x 10%

Total Cost of Non Pre-Priced Task = A + B + C + D + E + F

For Non Pre-priced Tasks Performed with Contractor's own forces:

A = The hourly rate for each trade classification not in the Construction Task Catalog® multiplied by the quantity;

B = The hourly, weekly, or monthly rate for each piece of equipment not in the Construction Task Catalog® multiplied by the quantity;

C = Lowest of three independent quotes for all materials.

Total for Non Pre-priced Tasks performed with Contractor's own forces = (A+B+C) x Non Pre-priced Task Adjustment Factor

For Non Pre-priced Tasks Performed by subcontractors:

If the Non Pre-priced Task will be subcontracted, the Contractor must submit three independent quotes for the work.

D = Lowest of three subcontractor quotes

Total for Non Pre-priced Tasks performed by subcontractors = D x Non Pre-priced Task Adjustment Factor

- 3.4.3.4. After a Non Pre-priced Task has been approved by the County, the Unit Price for such task will be established, and fixed as a permanent Non Pre-priced Task which will no longer require price justification.
 - 3.4.3.5. The County's determination as to whether a task is a Pre-priced Task or a Non Pre-priced Task shall be final, binding and conclusive as to the Contractor.
- 3.5. Whenever, because of trade jurisdiction rules or small quantities, the cost of a minor task in the Job Order Price Proposal is less than the cost of the actual labor and material to perform such task, the County may permit the Contractor to be paid for such task as a Non Pre- priced Task, or use Pre-priced labor tasks and material component pricing to cover the actual costs incurred. Provided, however, that there is no other work for that trade on the Project or other work for that trade cannot be scheduled at the same time and the final charge does not exceed \$1,000.
- 3.6. Contractor shall make the necessary arrangements for and obtain all filings and permits required for the Work, including the preparation of all drawings, sketches, calculations and other documents and information that may be required therefor. If the Contractor is required to pay an application fee for filing a project, a fee to obtain a building permit, or any other permit fee to the City, State or some other governmental or regulatory agency, then the amount of such fee paid by the Contractor for which a receipt is obtained shall be treated as a reimbursable fee work task. The cost of expediting services or equipment use fees are not reimbursable.
- 3.7. The adjustment for reimbursable fee work tasks is 1.0101.
- 3.8. The Contractor shall provide incidental engineering and architectural services required in connection with a particular Job Order including drawings and information required for filing.
- 3.9. The Contractor's Job Order Proposal shall be submitted by the date indicated on the Request for Job Order Proposal. All incomplete Job Order Proposals shall be rejected. The time allowed for preparation of the Contractor's Job Order Proposal will depend on the complexity and urgency of the Job Order but should average between seven and fourteen days. On complex Job Orders, such as Job Orders requiring incidental engineering/architectural drawings and approvals and permits, allowance will be made to provide adequate time for preparation and submittal of the necessary documents.
- 3.10. In emergency situations and minor maintenance and repair Job Orders requiring immediate completion, the Job Order Proposal may be required quickly and the due date will be so indicated on the Request for Job Order Proposal or, as described

below, the Contractor may be directed to begin work immediately with the paperwork to follow.

- 3.11. If the Contractor requires clarifications or additional information regarding the Detailed Scope of work in order to prepare the Job Order Proposal, the request must be submitted so that the submittal of the Job Order Proposal is not delayed.

4. REVIEW OF THE JOB ORDER PROPOSAL AND ISSUANCE OF THE JOB ORDER

- 4.1. The County will evaluate the entire Job Order Price Proposal and compare these with the County's estimate of the Detailed Scope of Work to determine the reasonableness of approach, including the appropriateness of the tasks and quantities proposed.

- 4.2. The Contractor may choose the means and methods of construction; subject however, to the County's right to reject any means and methods proposed by the Contractor that:

- 4.2.1. Will constitute or create a hazard to the work, or to persons or property;

- 4.2.2. Will not produce finished Work in accordance with the terms of the Contract; or

- 4.2.3. Unnecessarily increases the price of the Job Order when alternative means and methods are available.

- 4.3. The County reserves the right to reject a Job Order Proposal or cancel a Project for any reason. The County also reserves the right not to issue a Job Order if it is determined to be in the best interests of the County. The County may perform such work by other means. The Contractor shall not recover any costs arising out of or related to the development of the Job Order including but not limited to the costs to attend the Joint Scope Meeting, review the Detailed Scope of Work, prepare a Job Order Proposal (including incidental architectural and engineering services), subcontractor costs, and the costs to review the Job Order Proposal with the County.

- 4.4. By submitting a Job Order Proposal to the County, the Contractor agrees to accomplish the Detailed Scope of Work in accordance with the Request for Job Order Proposal at the lump sum price submitted. It is the Contractor's responsibility to include the necessary Pre- Priced Tasks and Non Pre-priced Tasks and quantities in the Job Order Price Proposal prior to delivering it to the County.

- 4.5. Each Job Order provided to the Contractor shall reference the Detailed Scope of Work and set forth the Job Order Price and the Job Order Completion Time. All clauses of this Contract shall be applicable to each Job Order. The Job Order, signed by the

County and delivered to the Contractor constitutes the County's acceptance of the Contractor's Job Order Proposal. A signed copy of the Job Order will be provided to the Contractor.

- 4.6. In the event that immediate emergency response is necessary, the Contractor shall be required to follow alternative procedures as established by the County. The Contractor shall begin work as directed notwithstanding the absence of a fully developed Request for Job Order Proposal, Detailed Scope of Work, or Job Order. The Contractor shall be compensated for such work as if the work had been ordered under the standard procedures.

5. ENR CCI ADJUSTMENT OF THE ADJUSTMENT FACTORS

- 5.1. Economic Price Adjustment: The Adjustment Factors may be updated on each anniversary of the award date to account for changes in construction costs, provided, the Contractor requests in writing, approximately fourteen to thirty days prior to the anniversary of the award date, that the Adjustment Factors be updated. Such request shall be delivered to the County and to Gordian. In the event the Contractor fails to deliver the request timely, then the County shall determine the date on which the Adjustment Factors will be updated, but in no event will such date be later than thirty days after the written request to update the Adjustment Factors is received by the County. Thereafter, the Contractor's Normal Working Hours and Other than Normal Hours Adjustment Factors will be adjusted according to the following:

- 5.1.1. A Base Year Index shall be calculated by averaging the 12-month Construction Cost Indices (CCI) for the average of the twenty cities (published in the Engineering News Record (ENR) for the 12 months immediately prior to the month of the bid due date (e.g. April bid date, Base Year Index is April of the prior year to March of the bid date year).

- 5.1.2. A Current Year Index shall be calculated by averaging the 12-month Construction Cost Indices (CCI) for the average of the twenty cities published in the Engineering News Record (ENR) for the 12 months beginning with the month of anniversary of the bid due date (e.g. April bid date, Current Year Index is April of the prior year to March of the current year).

- 5.1.3. The Economic Price Adjustment shall be calculated by dividing the Current Year Index by the Base Year Index.

- 5.1.4. The Contractor's original Adjustment Factors shall be multiplied by the Economic Price Adjustment to obtain the Contractor's new Adjustment Factors effective for the next 12 months.

- 5.1.5. Averages shall be obtained by summing the 12 month indices and dividing by

12.

5.1.6. All calculations in this article shall be carried to the fifth decimal place and rounded to the fourth decimal place. The following rules shall be used for rounding:

5.1.7. The fourth decimal place shall be rounded up when the fifth decimal place is five (5) or greater.

5.1.8. The fourth decimal place shall remain unchanged when the fifth decimal place is less than five (5).

5.2. ENR occasionally revises indices. ENR CCIs used in the calculations described above shall be those currently published at the time the Economic Price Adjustment calculation is performed. No retroactive adjustments will be made as a result of an ENR revision. Revised CCI indices, if any, shall be used in subsequent calculations.

5.3. Under all circumstances, should the Contractor submit a Job Order Proposal with inaccurate Adjustment Factors, the act of submission by the Contractor is a waiver of all rights to any further compensation above the Job Order Price submitted in the Job Order Proposal.

5.4. The Contractor cannot delay submission of the Job Order Proposal past the due date to take advantage of a scheduled update of the Adjustment Factors. In that event, the Contractor shall use the Adjustment Factors that would have been in effect without the delay.

6. JOC SYSTEM LICENSE FEE

The County selected The Gordian Group's (Gordian) Job Order Contracting (JOC) System for their JOC program. The Gordian JOC Solution includes Gordian's proprietary Gordian Cloud and Bid Safe® JOC Applications and Construction Task Catalog®, which shall be used by the Contractor to prepare and submit Job Order Proposals, subcontractor lists, and other requirements specified by the County. The Contractor shall be required to execute Gordian's JOC System License and Fee Agreement to obtain access to the Gordian JOC Solution.

THE CONSTRUCTION TASK CATALOG®

The Construction Task Catalog® is part of the Contract Documents and included by reference. The Construction Task Catalog® is available as a separate PDF document and will be issued with the Step Two procurement.

7. THE TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

The Technical Specifications are part of the Contract Documents and included by reference. The Technical Specifications are available as a separate PDF document and will be issued with the Step Two procurement.

Standard Instructions to Vendors

Request for Proposals, Request for Qualifications, or Request for Letters of Interest

Vendors are instructed to read and follow the instructions carefully, as any misinterpretation or failure to comply with instructions may lead to a Vendor's submittal being rejected.

Vendor MUST submit its solicitation response electronically and MUST confirm its submittal in order for the County to receive a valid response through BidSync. Refer to the [Purchasing Division website](#) or contact BidSync for submittal instructions.

A. Responsiveness Criteria:

In accordance with Broward County Procurement Code Section 21.8.b.65, a Responsive Bidder [Vendor] means a person who has submitted a proposal which conforms in all material respects to a solicitation. The solicitation submittal of a responsive Vendor must be submitted on the required forms, which contain all required information, signatures, notarizations, insurance, bonding, security, or other mandated requirements required by the solicitation documents to be submitted at the time of proposal opening.

Failure to provide the information required below at the time of submittal opening may result in a recommendation Vendor is non-responsive by the Director of Purchasing. The Selection or Evaluation Committee will determine whether the firm is responsive to the requirements specified herein. The County reserves the right to waive minor technicalities or irregularities as is in the best interest of the County in accordance with Section 21.30.f.1(c) of the Broward County Procurement Code.

Below are standard responsiveness criteria; refer to **Special Instructions to Vendors**, for Additional Responsiveness Criteria requirement(s).

1. Lobbyist Registration Requirement Certification

Refer to **Lobbyist Registration Requirement Certification**. The completed form should be submitted with the solicitation response but must be submitted within three business days of County's request. Vendor may be deemed non-responsive for failure to fully comply within stated timeframes.

2. Addenda

The County reserves the right to amend this solicitation prior to the due date. Any change(s) to this solicitation will be conveyed through the written addenda process. Only written addenda will be binding. If a "must" addendum is issued, Vendor must follow instructions and submit required information, forms, or acknowledge addendum, as instructed therein. It is the responsibility of all potential Vendors to monitor the solicitation for any changing information, prior to submitting their response.

B. Responsibility Criteria:

Definition of a Responsible Vendor: In accordance with Section 21.8.b.64 of the Broward County Procurement Code, a Responsible Vendor means a Vendor who has the capability in all respects to perform the contract requirements, and the integrity and reliability which will assure good faith performance.

The Selection or Evaluation Committee will recommend to the awarding authority a determination of a Vendor's responsibility. At any time prior to award, the awarding authority may find that a Vendor is

not responsible to receive a particular award.

Failure to provide any of this required information and in the manner required may result in a recommendation by the Director of Purchasing that the Vendor is non-responsive.

Below are standard responsibility criteria; refer to **Special Instructions to Vendors**, for Additional Responsibility Criteria requirement(s).

1. Litigation History

- a. All Vendors are required to disclose to the County all “material” cases filed, pending, or resolved during the last three (3) years prior to the solicitation response due date, whether such cases were brought by or against the Vendor, any parent or subsidiary of the Vendor, or any predecessor organization. Additionally, all Vendors are required to disclose to the County all “material” cases filed, pending, or resolved against any principal of Vendor, regardless of whether the principal was associated with Vendor at the time of the “material” cases against the principal, during the last three (3) years prior to the solicitation response. A case is considered to be “material” if it relates, in whole or in part, to any of the following:
 - i. A similar type of work that the vendor is seeking to perform for the County under the current solicitation;
 - ii. An allegation of fraud, negligence, error or omissions, or malpractice against the vendor or any of its principals or agents who would be performing work under the current solicitation;
 - iii. A vendor’s default, termination, suspension, failure to perform, or improper performance in connection with any contract;
 - iv. The financial condition of the vendor, including any bankruptcy petition (voluntary and involuntary) or receivership; or
 - v. A criminal proceeding or hearing concerning business-related offenses in which the vendor or its principals (including officers) were/are defendants.
- b. For each material case, the Vendor is required to provide all information identified in the **Litigation History Form**. Additionally, the Vendor shall provide a copy of any judgment or settlement of any material case during the last three (3) years prior to the solicitation response. Redactions of any confidential portions of the settlement agreement are only permitted upon a certification by Vendor that all redactions are required under the express terms of a pre-existing confidentiality agreement or provision.
- c. The County will consider a Vendor's litigation history information in its review and determination of responsibility.
- d. If the Vendor is a joint venture, the information provided should encompass the joint venture and each of the entities forming the joint venture.
- e. A vendor is required to disclose to the County any and all cases(s) that exist between the County and any of the Vendor's subcontractors/subconsultants proposed to work on this project during the last five (5) years prior to the solicitation response.
- f. Failure to disclose any material case, including all requested information in connection with each such case, as well as failure to disclose the Vendor’s subcontractors/subconsultants litigation history against the County, may result in the Vendor being deemed non-responsive.

2. Financial Information

- a. All Vendors are required to provide the Vendor's financial statements at the time of submittal in order to demonstrate the Vendor's financial capabilities.

- b. Each Vendor shall submit its most recent two years of financial statements for review. The financial statements are not required to be audited financial statements. The annual financial statements will be in the form of:
 - i. Balance sheets, income statements and annual reports; or
 - ii. Tax returns; or
 - iii. SEC filings.

If tax returns are submitted, ensure it does not include any personal information (as defined under Florida Statutes Section 501.171, Florida Statutes), such as social security numbers, bank account or credit card numbers, or any personal pin numbers. If any personal information data is part of financial statements, redact information prior to submitting a response the County.

- c. If a Vendor has been in business for less than the number of years of required financial statements, then the Vendor must disclose all years that the Vendor has been in business, including any partial year-to-date financial statements.
- d. The County may consider the unavailability of the most recent year's financial statements and whether the Vendor acted in good faith in disclosing the financial documents in its evaluation.
- e. Any claim of confidentiality on financial statements should be asserted at the time of submittal. Refer to **Standard Instructions to Vendors**, Confidential Material/ Public Records and Exemptions for instructions on submitting confidential financial statements. The Vendor's failure to provide the information as instructed may lead to the information becoming public.
- f. Although the review of a Vendor's financial information is an issue of responsibility, the failure to either provide the financial documentation or correctly assert a confidentiality claim pursuant the Florida Public Records Law and the solicitation requirements (Confidential Material/ Public Records and Exemptions section) may result in a recommendation of non-responsiveness by the Director of Purchasing.

3. Authority to Conduct Business in Florida

- a. A Vendor must have the authority to transact business in the State of Florida and be in good standing with the Florida Secretary of State. For further information, contact the Florida Department of State, Division of Corporations.
- b. The County will review the Vendor's business status based on the information provided in response to this solicitation.
- c. It is the Vendor's responsibility to comply with all state and local business requirements.
- d. Vendor should list its active Florida Department of State Division of Corporations Document Number (or Registration No. for fictitious names) in the **Vendor Questionnaire**, Question No. 10.
- e. If a Vendor is an out-of-state or foreign corporation or partnership, the Vendor must obtain the authority to transact business in the State of Florida or show evidence of application for the authority to transact business in the State of Florida, upon request of the County.
- f. A Vendor that is not in good standing with the Florida Secretary of State at the time of a submission to this solicitation may be deemed non-responsible.

- g. If successful in obtaining a contract award under this solicitation, the Vendor must remain in good standing throughout the contractual period of performance.

4. Affiliated Entities of the Principal(s)

- a. All Vendors are required to disclose the names and addresses of “affiliated entities” of the Vendor’s principal(s) over the last five (5) years (from the solicitation opening deadline) that have acted as a prime Vendor with the County. The Vendor is required to provide all information required on the **Affiliated Entities of the Principal(s) Certification Form**.
- b. The County will review all affiliated entities of the Vendor’s principal(s) for contract performance evaluations and the compliance history with the County’s Small Business Program, including CBE, DBE and SBE goal attainment requirements. “Affiliated entities” of the principal(s) are those entities related to the Vendor by the sharing of stock or other means of control, including but not limited to a subsidiary, parent or sibling entity.
- c. The County will consider the contract performance evaluations and the compliance history of the affiliated entities of the Vendor’s principals in its review and determination of responsibility.

5. Insurance Requirements

The **Insurance Requirement Form** reflects the insurance requirements deemed necessary for this project. It is not necessary to have this level of insurance in effect at the time of submittal, but it is necessary to submit certificates indicating that the Vendor currently carries the insurance or to submit a letter from the carrier indicating it can provide insurance coverages.

C. Additional Information and Certifications

The following forms and supporting information (if applicable) should be returned with Vendor’s submittal. If not provided with submittal, the Vendor must submit within three business days of County’s request. Failure to timely submit may affect Vendor’s evaluation.

1. Vendor Questionnaire

Vendor is required to submit detailed information on their firm. Refer to the **Vendor Questionnaire** and submit as instructed.

2. Standard Certifications

Vendor is required to certify to the below requirements. Refer to the **Standard Certifications** and submit as instructed.

- a. **Cone of Silence Requirement Certification**
- b. **Drug-Free Workplace Certification**
- c. **Non-Collusion Certification**
- d. **Public Entities Crimes Certification**
- e. **Scrutinized Companies List Certification**

3. Subcontractors/Subconsultants/Suppliers Requirement

The Vendor shall submit a listing of all subcontractors, subconsultants, and major material suppliers, if any, and the portion of the contract they will perform. Vendors must follow the instructions included on the **Subcontractors/Subconsultants/Suppliers Information Form** and submit as instructed.

D. Standard Agreement Language Requirements

1. The acceptance of or any exceptions taken to the terms and conditions of the County's Agreement shall be considered a part of a Vendor's submittal and will be considered by the Selection or Evaluation Committee.
2. The applicable Agreement terms and conditions for this solicitation are indicated in the **Special Instructions to Vendors**.
3. Vendors are required to review the applicable terms and conditions and submit the **Agreement Exception Form**. If the **Agreement Exception Form** is not provided with the submittal, it shall be deemed an affirmation by the Vendor that it accepts the Agreement terms and conditions as disclosed in the solicitation.
4. If exceptions are taken, the Vendor must specifically identify each term and condition with which it is taking an exception. Any exception not specifically listed is deemed waived. Simply identifying a section or article number is not sufficient to state an exception. Provide either a redlined version of the specific change(s) or specific proposed alternative language. Additionally, a brief justification specifically addressing each provision to which an exception is taken should be provided.
5. Submission of any exceptions to the Agreement does not denote acceptance by the County. Furthermore, taking exceptions to the County's terms and conditions may be viewed unfavorably by the Selection or Evaluation Committee and ultimately may impact the overall evaluation of a Vendor's submittal.

E. Evaluation Criteria

1. The Selection or Evaluation Committee will evaluate Vendors as per the **Evaluation Criteria**. The County reserves the right to obtain additional information from a Vendor.
2. Vendor has a continuing obligation to inform the County in writing of any material changes to the information it has previously submitted. The County reserves the right to request additional information from Vendor at any time.
3. For Request for Proposals, the following shall apply:
 - a. The Director of Purchasing may recommend to the Evaluation Committee to short list the most qualified firms prior to the Final Evaluation.
 - b. The Evaluation Criteria identifies points available; a total of 100 points is available.
 - c. If the Evaluation Criteria includes a request for pricing, the total points awarded for price is determined by applying the following formula:
$$\frac{(\text{Lowest Proposed Price}/\text{Vendor's Price}) \times (\text{Maximum Number of Points for Price})}{\text{Price Score}}$$
 - d. After completion of scoring, the County may negotiate pricing as in its best interest.
4. For Requests for Letters of Interest or Request for Qualifications, the following shall apply:
 - a. The Selection or Evaluation Committee will create a short list of the most qualified firms.
 - b. The Selection or Evaluation Committee will either:
 - i. Rank shortlisted firms; or

- ii. If the solicitation is part of a two-step procurement, shortlisted firms will be requested to submit a response to the Step Two procurement.

F. Demonstrations

If applicable, as indicated in Special Instructions to Vendors, Vendors will be required to demonstrate the nature of their offered solution. After receipt of submittals, all Vendors will receive a description of, and arrangements for, the desired demonstration. In accordance with Section 286.0113 of the Florida Statutes and pursuant to the direction of the Broward County Board of Commissioners, demonstrations are closed to only the vendor team and County staff.

G. Presentations

Vendors that are found to be both responsive and responsible to the requirements of the solicitation and/or shortlisted (if applicable) will have an opportunity to make an oral presentation to the Selection or Evaluation Committee on the Vendor's approach to this project and the Vendor's ability to perform. The committee may provide a list of subject matter for the discussion. All Vendor's will have equal time to present but the question-and-answer time may vary. In accordance with Section 286.0113 of the Florida Statutes and the direction of the Broward County Board of Commissioners, presentations during Selection or Evaluation Committee Meetings are closed. Only the Selection or Evaluation Committee members, County staff and the vendor and their team scheduled for that presentation will be present in the Meeting Room during the presentation and subsequent question and answer period.

H. Public Art and Design Program

If indicated in **Special Instructions to Vendors**, Public Art and Design Program, Section 1-88, Broward County Code of Ordinances, applies to this project. It is the intent of the County to functionally integrate art, when applicable, into capital projects and integrate artists' design concepts into this improvement project. The Vendor may be required to collaborate with the artist(s) on design development within the scope of this request. Artist(s) shall be selected by Broward County through an independent process. For additional information, contact the Broward County Cultural Division.

I. Committee Appointment

The Cone of Silence shall be in effect for County staff at the time of the Selection or Evaluation Committee appointment and for County Commissioners and Commission staff at the time of the Shortlist Meeting of the Selection Committee or the Initial Evaluation Meeting of the Evaluation Committee. The committee members appointed for this solicitation are available on the Purchasing Division's website under [Committee Appointment](#).

J. Committee Questions, Request for Clarifications, Additional Information

At any committee meeting, the Selection or Evaluation Committee members may ask questions, request clarification, or require additional information of any Vendor's submittal or proposal. It is highly recommended Vendors attend to answer any committee questions (if requested), including a Vendor representative that has the authority to bind.

Vendor's answers may impact evaluation (and scoring, if applicable). Upon written request to the Purchasing Agent prior to the meeting, a conference call number will be made available for Vendor participation via teleconference. Only Vendors that are found to be both responsive and responsible to the requirements of the solicitation and/or shortlisted (if applicable) are requested to participate in a final (or presentation) Selection or Evaluation committee meeting.

K. Vendor Questions

The County provides a specified time for Vendors to ask questions and seek clarification regarding solicitation requirements. All questions or clarification inquiries must be submitted through BidSync by the date and time referenced in the solicitation document (including any addenda). The County will respond to questions via Bid Sync.

L. Confidential Material/ Public Records and Exemptions

1. Broward County is a public agency subject to Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. Upon receipt, all submittals become "public records" and shall be subject to public disclosure consistent with Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. Submittals may be posted on the County's public website or included in a public records request response, unless there is a declaration of "confidentiality" pursuant to the public records law and in accordance with the procedures in this section.
2. Any confidential material(s) the Vendor asserts is exempt from public disclosure under Florida Statutes must be labeled as "Confidential", and marked with the specific statute and subsection asserting exemption from Public Records.
3. To submit confidential material, three hardcopies must be submitted in a sealed envelope, labeled with the solicitation number, title, date and the time of solicitation opening to:

4. Material will not be treated as confidential if the Vendor does not cite the applicable Florida Statute (s) allowing the document to be treated as confidential.
5. Any materials that the Vendor claims to be confidential and exempt from public records must be marked and separated from the submittal. If the Vendor does not comply with these instructions, the Vendor's claim for confidentiality will be deemed as waived.
6. Submitting confidential material may impact full discussion of your submittal by the Selection or Evaluation Committee because the Committee will be unable to discuss the details contained in the documents cloaked as confidential at the publicly noticed Committee meeting.

M. Copyrighted Materials

Copyrighted material is not exempt from the Public Records Law, Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. Submission of copyrighted material in response to any solicitation will constitute a license and permission for the County to make copies (including electronic copies) as reasonably necessary for the use by County staff and agents, as well as to make the materials available for inspection or production pursuant to Public Records Law, Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.

N. State and Local Preferences

2. Staff identifies any incomplete responses. The final determination of responsiveness rests solely on the decision of the committee.

S. Vendor Protest

Sections 21.118 and 21.120 of the Broward County Procurement Code set forth procedural requirements that apply if a Vendor intends to protest a solicitation or proposed award of a contract and state in part the following:

1. Any protest concerning the solicitation or other solicitation specifications or requirements must be made and received by the County within seven business days from the posting of the solicitation or addendum on the Purchasing Division's website. Such protest must be made in writing to the Director of Purchasing. Failure to timely protest solicitation specifications or requirements is a waiver of the ability to protest the specifications or requirements.
2. Any protest concerning a solicitation or proposed award above the award authority of the

Director of Purchasing, after the RLI or RFP opening, shall be submitted in writing and received by the Director of Purchasing within five business days from the posting of the recommendation of award for Invitation to Bids or the final recommendation of ranking for Request for Letters of Interest and Request for Proposals on the Purchasing Division's website.

3. Any actual or prospective Vendor who has a substantial interest in and is aggrieved in connection with the proposed award of a contract that does not exceed the amount of the award authority of the Director of Purchasing, may protest to the Director of Purchasing. The protest shall be submitted in writing and received within three (3) business days from the posting of the recommendation of award for Invitation to Bids or the final recommendation of ranking for Request for Letters of Interest and Request for Proposals on the Purchasing Division's website.

4. For purposes of this section, a business day is defined as Monday through Friday between 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Failure to timely file a protest within the time prescribed for a proposed contract award shall be a waiver of the Vendor's right to protest.

5. As a condition of initiating any protest, the protestor shall present the Director of Purchasing a nonrefundable filing fee in accordance with the table below.

If no contract proposal amount was submitted, the estimated contract amount shall be the County's estimated contract price for the project. The County may accept cash, money order, certified check, or cashier's check, payable to Broward County Board of Commissioners.

T. Right of Appeal

Pursuant to Section 21.83.d of the Broward County Procurement Code, any Vendor that has a substantial interest in the matter and is dissatisfied or aggrieved in connection with the Selection or Evaluation Committee's determination of responsiveness may appeal the determination pursuant to Section 21.120 of the Broward County Procurement Code.

1. The appeal must be in writing and sent to the Director of Purchasing within ten (10) calendar days of the determination by the Selection or Evaluation Committee to be deemed timely.

2. As required by Section 21.120, the appeal must be accompanied by an appeal bond by a Vendor having standing to protest and must comply with all other requirements of this section.

3. The institution and filing of an appeal is an administrative remedy to be employed prior to the institution and filing of any civil action against the County concerning the subject matter of the appeal.

U. Rejection of Responses

The Selection or Evaluation Committee may recommend rejecting all submittals as in the best interests of the County. The rejection shall be made by the Director of Purchasing, except when a

solicitation was approved by the Board, in which case the rejection shall be made by the Board.

V. Negotiations

The County intends to conduct the first negotiation meeting no later than two weeks after approval of the final ranking as recommended by the Selection or Evaluation Committee. In the event that the negotiations are not successful within a reasonable timeframe (notification will be provided to the Vendor) an impasse will be declared and negotiations with the first-ranked Vendor will cease. 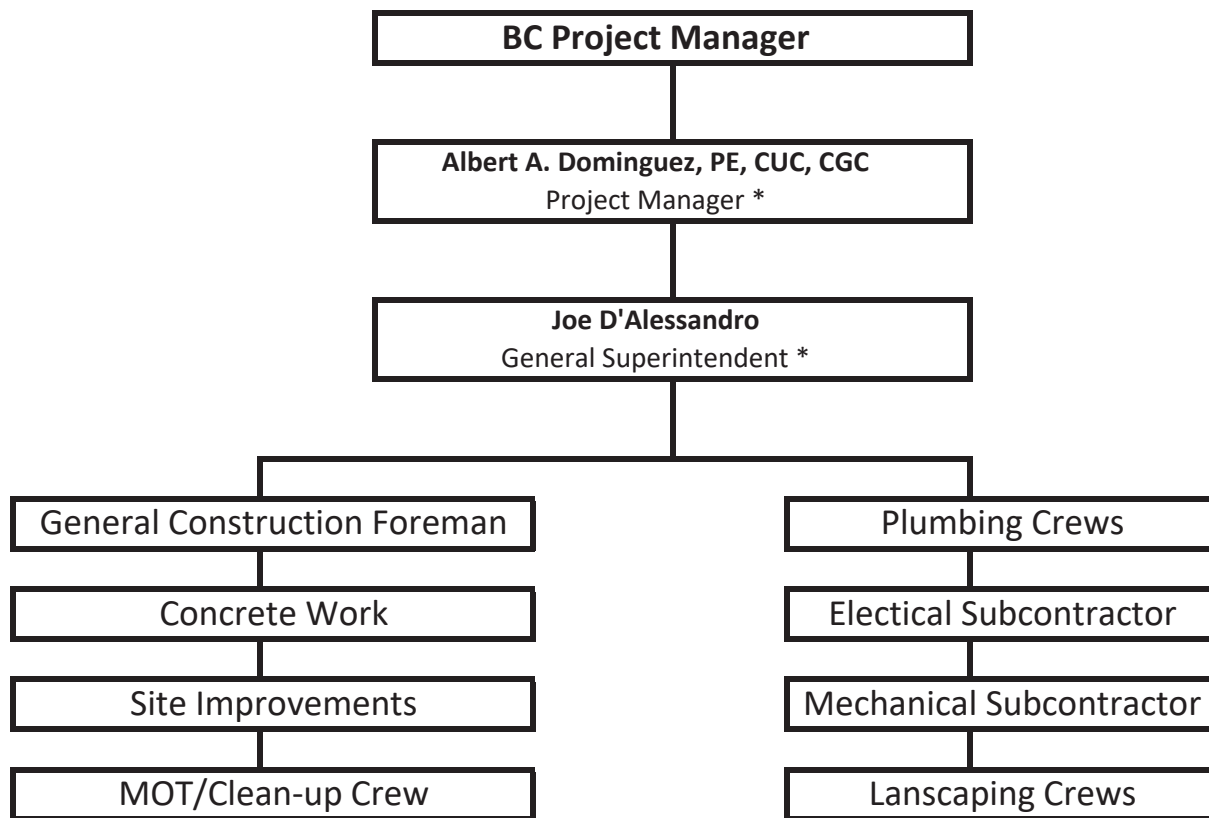

I. Committee Appointment

J. Committee Questions, Request for Clarifications, Additional Information

At any committee meeting, the Selection or Evaluation Committee members may ask questions, request clarification, or require additional information of any Vendor's submittal or proposal. It is highly recommended Vendors attend to answer any committee questions (if requested), including a Vendor representative that has the authority to bind.

Vendor's answers may impact evaluation (and scoring, if applicable). Upon written request to the Purchasing Agent prior to the meeting, a conference call number will be made available for Vendor participation via teleconference. Only Vendors that are found to be both responsive and responsible to the requirements of the solicitation and/or shortlisted (if applicable) are requested to participate in a final (or presentation) Selection or Evaluation committee meeting.

K. Vendor Questions

The County provides a specified time for Vendors to ask questions and seek clarification regarding solicitation requirements. L. Confidential Material/ Public Records and Exemptions

1. Broward County is a public agency subject to Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. Upon receipt, all submittals become "public records" and shall be subject to public disclosure consistent with Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. Submittals may be posted on the County's public website or included in a public records request response, unless there is a declaration of "confidentiality" pursuant to the public records law and in accordance with the procedures in this section.
2. Any confidential material(s) the Vendor asserts is exempt from public disclosure under Florida Statutes must be labeled as "Confidential", and marked with the specific statute and subsection asserting exemption from Public Records.
3. To submit confidential material, three hardcopies must be submitted in a sealed envelope, labeled with the solicitation number, title, date and the time of solicitation opening to:

M. Copyrighted Materials

N. State and Local Preferences

O. Local Preference

Except where otherwise prohibited by federal or state law or other funding source restrictions, a local Vendor whose submittal is within 5% of the highest total ranked Vendor outside of the preference area will become the Vendor with whom the County will proceed with negotiations for a

P. Tiebreaker Criteria

R. Review and Evaluation of Responses

A Selection or Evaluation Committee is responsible for recommending the most qualified Vendor(s). The process for this procurement may proceed in the following manner:

1. The Purchasing Division delivers the solicitation submittals to agency staff for summarization for the committee members. Agency staff prepares a report, including a matrix of responses submitted by the Vendors. This may include a technical review, if applicable.
2. Staff identifies any incomplete responses. The Director of Purchasing reviews the information and makes a recommendation to the Selection or Evaluation Committee as to each Vendor's responsiveness to the requirements of the solicitation. The final determination of responsiveness rests solely on the decision of the committee.
3. At any time prior to award, the awarding authority may find that a Vendor is not responsible to receive a particular award. The awarding authority may consider the following factors, without limitation: debarment or removal from the authorized Vendors list or a final decree, declaration or order by a court or administrative hearing officer or tribunal of competent jurisdiction that the Vendor has breached or failed to perform a contract, claims history of the Vendor, performance history on a County contract(s), an unresolved concern, or any other cause under this code and Florida law for evaluating the responsibility of a Vendor.

S. Vendor Protest

Any protest concerning a solicitation or proposed award above the award authority of the Director of Purchasing, after the RLI or RFP opening, shall be submitted in writing and received by the Director of Purchasing within five business days from the posting of the recommendation of award for Invitation to Bids or the final recommendation of ranking for Request for Letters of Interest and Request for Proposals on the Purchasing Division's website.
3. Any actual or prospective Vendor who has a substantial interest in and is aggrieved in connection with the proposed award of a contract that does not exceed the amount of the award authority of the Director of Purchasing, may protest to the Director of Purchasing. The protest shall be submitted in writing and received within three (3) business days from the posting of the recommendation of award for Invitation to Bids or the final recommendation of ranking for Request for Letters of Interest and Request for Proposals on the Purchasing Division's website.
4. For purposes of this section, a business day is defined as Monday through Friday between 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Failure to timely file a protest within the time prescribed for a proposed contract award shall be a waiver of the Vendor's right to protest.

T. Right of Appeal
