

Items That DO NOT Go Into Your Recycling Container



- Household garbage including food scraps
- Soiled pizza boxes
- Toys and cups
- Black bags or styrofoam
- Window and auto glass, light bulbs, mirrors, glass cookware and ceramics
- Medical waste and pharmaceuticals
- Yard and plant debris
- Gas cylinders, tanks, building debris, sheet rock, flammables and small appliances
- Electronic items including computers, TVs and monitors**
- Hazardous waste including motor oil, paint, pesticides and household cleansers**



Participation may vary by city. To find out if your municipality is participating in the "All-In-One" recycling program, contact your city directly. ** Visit www.broward.org/recycling for more information on the proper disposal of these items.

Broward County Solid Waste and Recycling Services has introduced a new and convenient way to increase recycling in your community. It's as easy as 1, 2, 3!

How to Get Started

1. Establish a recycling program that collects the following items:

- Plastic bottles and containers
- Aluminum and steel food and beverage containers
- Newspapers, magazines and cardboard
- Glass food and beverage containers

2. Arrange to have your recyclables picked up by a permitted hauler.

- Talk to your current waste hauler. Many offer recycling services.
- Contact your city or the County to assist with determining your service provider options.
- If you choose your existing waste hauler, check to see if you can reduce your level of waste service (either the size of your current waste container or frequency of pick-up) to help offset the cost of implementing a recycling program.

3. Work with us to design a recycling program that fits your property's needs.

- Identify the types of collection containers you'll need, how many and where you should place them.
- Design a system for collecting recyclables and moving them to a central location for hauling.
- Educate residents on your new program and the benefits of recycling.
- Appoint a capable and enthusiastic person as your recycling coordinator.

Items That Can Be Mixed Together



Newspapers, inserts, catalogs, magazines, junk mail, office paper, soft-covered books, file folders, soda cartons and crushed boxes from items such as cereal, tissues, rice and pasta



Flattened cardboard from non-soiled items such as shipping boxes



Aluminum and steel food and beverage containers



Milk and juice cartons and drink boxes



Glass food and beverage containers



Plastic bottles with neck narrower than body such as soda bottles, milk, water, detergent and shampoo bottles (without caps or lids)

27%* of waste consists of paper.

26%* is composed of glass, metals and plastics.

47%* consists of food waste, organics, and other materials.
