of Care Board ("Homeless Continuum of Care Board") ("HCoC"). The Homeless Continuum of Care Board HCoC shall will serve in an advisory capacity to the Broward County Board of County Commissioners ("Board"), making recommendations to the Board for the establishment and implementation of the Homeless Continuum of Care, programs and services for the community-based homeless assistance program planning network of providers comprised of various organizations within Broward County, to efficiently and effectively deliver coordinated housing and related services to the homeless in Broward County. The Homeless Continuum of Care Board HCoC shall will also act advocate on behalf of the Homeless Continuum of Care, as defined by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 11381 et seq. ("Act"), 24 C.F.R. Part 578, and Chapter 420, Florida Statutes, to provide collaborative local homeless assistance efforts through Homeless Continuum of Care programs the network of providers in Broward County authorized by the federal HEARTH Act, 42 U.S.C. 11371 et seq., and 24 CFR Part 576.

Section 2. Section 12.153 of the Broward County Administrative Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

12.153. Composition; Nominations and Appointments.

(a) The Homeless Continuum of Care Board ("HCOC") HCoC shall will be composed of twenty-eight (28) thirty (30) voting members and two (2) nonvoting ex-officio ex officio members, for a total of thirty-two (32) members. The Board of County Commissioners ("Board") shall will appoint

1 2 members to the HCOC HCoC from persons nominated as follows, with nominations by the Board made in accordance with applicable advisory board categorical draw processes:

- One (1) representative nominated by the Broward County Housing Council;
- 2. One (1) Public Housing Authority representative nominated by one (1) of the following housing authorities in the order designated below. This seat shall will rotate every two (2) years between the three (3) six (6) housing authorities biennially to ensure full representation:
 - a. Broward County Housing Authority;
 - b. Housing Authority of the City of Fort Lauderdale; and
 - c. Hollywood Housing Authority;
 - d. Dania Beach Housing Authority;
 - e. Pompano Beach Housing Authority; and
 - f. Deerfield Beach Housing Authority;
- 3. Two (2) Hospital District representatives:
 - A representative nominated by the North Broward Hospital
 District (doing business as "Broward Health"); and
 - A representative nominated by the South Broward Hospital
 District (doing business as "Memorial Healthcare System");
- One (1) representative nominated by the United Way of Broward County, Inc.;

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- 5. Three (3) corrections or law enforcement representatives nominated as follows:
 - a. One (1) member nominated by the Broward Sheriff's Office of the Sheriff of Broward County;
 - b. One (1) member nominated by The Chief of Police of the City
 of Fort Lauderdale Police Department, or his or her designee
 who will be a major who oversees homeless street outreach;
 and
 - c. One (1) member nominated by The Chief of Police of the City of Hollywood Police Department, or his or her designee who will be a major who oversees homeless street outreach;
- 6. One (1) Broward County Commissioner nominated by the Mayor;
- 7. One (1) representative of a domestic violence services organization nominated by a Broward County Commissioner and appointed by the Board:
- 8. Three (3) elected municipal officials or designees employees from municipalities that are designated as a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") Entitlement entitlement Community community, each nominated by the corresponding municipality as follows:
 - a. One (1) from the City of Fort Lauderdale;
 - b. One (1) from the City of Hollywood; and
 - c. One (1) from the City of Pompano Beach;

- The Chairperson of the Homeless Provider and Stakeholders' Stakeholder's Council;
- 10. Three (3) advocate representatives for the homeless <u>nominated by a Broward County Commissioner and</u> appointed by the Board, one (1) in <u>for</u> each of the following <u>areas populations of focus</u>: youth; <u>family families</u>; and veterans <u>affairs</u>;
- Two (2) persons who are currently homeless or who have formerly experienced homelessness, nominated by a Broward County Commissioner and appointed by the Board;
- One (1) Greater Fort Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce representative nominated by its Board of Directors;
- One (1) representative nominated by <u>The Chief Executive Officer</u>, or <u>his or her designee</u>, of CareerSource Broward or successor entity;
- One (1) representative nominated by the <u>Board of Directors of</u>
 Broward Behavioral Health Coalition, <u>Inc.</u>;
- 15. One (1) faith-based organization representative appointed by the Board;
- 16. One (1) representative of a recipient or subrecipient of a HUD Emergency Solutions Grant Recipient (authorized by the Act, 42 U.S.C. 11371 et seq., and 24 C.F.R. Part 576), nominated by a Broward County Commissioner and appointed by the Board. This appointment shall will not be subject to either Section 1-233(b)(1) or Section 1-233(b)(3), Broward County Code of Ordinances ("Code");

- 17. One (1) representative nominated by the School Board of Broward County, Florida;
- 18. One (1) nonvoting ex-officio member nominated by the operator of the Central Homeless Assistance Center;
- 49. One (1) 18. Two (2) nonvoting ex-officio ex officio members; one (1) member nominated by the operators operator(s) of the North and Central Homeless Assistance Centers, or and one (1) member nominated by the operator of the South Homeless Assistance Centers.; This ex-officio seat shall rotate between the two (2) centers biennially to ensure full participation; and
- 20. 19. One (1) representative of an affordable housing developer, defined as an entity or individual that uses SHIP State Housing Initiatives Partnership, SAIL State Apartment Incentive Loan, HOME Investment Partnerships, CDBG, State Tax Credits, other state program funds, or other federal funds when developing affordable housing, nominated by a Broward County Commissioner and appointed by the Board;
- 21. 20. One representative nominated by the Greater Fort Lauderdale Alliance Foundation, Inc.; and
- 22. One (1) representative nominated by the Broward Workshop, Inc.:
- 22. The Chief Executive Officer, or his or her designee, from the Florida

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- <u>Department of Children and Families ("DCF") community-based care</u> <u>lead agency, as defined in Section 409.986(3)(d), Florida Statutes;</u> <u>and</u>
- 23. The William "Bill" Kling Department of Veterans Affairs Outpatient
 Clinic Director, or his or her designee who oversees services
 provided to homeless veterans or works with homeless veterans.
- (b) Advocates are defined as individuals who are not providers and who do not receive funding from Broward County. Advocates shall must be free of any conflict of interest incurred by being an employee of a nonprofit or for-profit agency receiving funding, and shall must submit a letter of resignation if a conflict develops after appointment.
- (c) Individuals from the community who are not appointed to the HCOC HCOC may serve on task forces and subcommittees as established by the HCOC HCOC. Appointments to fill task forces and subcommittees shall will be at the discretion of the HCOC Chair of the HCOC.
- (d) Representatives nominated by entities holding a seat on the HCoC to be appointed by the Board will not be subject to the Broward County residency requirements set forth in Section 1-233(b)(1) of the Code. Broward County residency will be required for all persons nominated by a Broward County Commissioner to be appointed by the Board. For appointments at large, a person appointed to an advisory board or other board shall be a resident of Broward County and shall maintain residency in Broward County during the term of appointment. For all other appointments based on respective positions within the County, Broward County residency is not required.

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(d)(e) For appointments nominated by outside entities based on respective positions within the County, Broward County residency is not required.

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Section 3. Section 12.154 of the Broward County Administrative Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

12.154. Term of Appointees.

- (a) A member of the HCOC HCoC whose seat rotates on a recurring basis ("rotating category") shall may serve in such rotating category for two (2) years or until his or her successor is appointed, whichever is sooner. All other members of the HCOC HCoC shall will serve in accordance with Section 1-233, Broward County Code of Ordinances ("Code") of the Code, and are specifically exempt from the requirements set forth in Section 1-233(b)(2) of the Code.
- (b) Upon the expiration of a term, a member of the HCOC HCOC not in a rotating category shall may continue to serve until a successor is appointed, under the provisions set forth in Section 1-233 of the Code.
- (c) Any appointed member may be removed by the Board for misconduct, incompetency, or neglect of duty on its own motion or upon recommendation of the HCOC HCOC.
- (d) The meetings, quorum, organization, and attendance requirements of the HCOC HCoC shall will be as set forth in Section 1-233 of the Code.
- (e) The HCOC HCOC shall will elect a chair and such other officers as are deemed necessary for purposes of managing its activities and bringing

recommendations for homeless services from the 2 Homeless Initiative Partnership ("HIP") Section and provide documentation 3 of support to the Board. 4 (b) The Board shall collect information and data on needs and services of 5 individuals and families experiencing homelessness in Broward County; 6 shall assist agencies of Broward County government in assessing needs; 7 shall render advice and recommendations on services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness and on such other matters as the 8 9 Board considers pertinent to the welfare of individuals and families 10 experiencing homelessness in Broward County; and shall cause to be prepared, and shall submit to the County on or by September 30th of each 11 year, recommendations of service funding categories on behalf of 12 13 individuals and families experiencing homelessness in Broward County. 14 3. Review, at least annually, the A Way Home: Broward County, Florida's Ten 15 (c) Year Plan to End Homelessness ("Action Consolidated Plan"), developed 16 17 in accordance with 24 C.F.R. 578.27, at least annually to ensure that the Action Consolidated Plan continues to meet the needs of the homeless and 18 the community at large in Broward County. The Consolidated Plan is to be 19 20 updated at least every three (3) years. Submit to the Board, on an annual basis, a final report summarizing and 21 4. Review Process. 17 The performance of the Homeless Continuum of Care Board HCoC shall will, in 18 accordance with the procedures adopted pursuant to Section 2.09 of the Broward County 19 Charter, be reviewed by the Board to ensure that the Homeless Continuum of Care Board 20 HCoC is meeting the objectives set forth in the Action Consolidated Plan. 21 22 Section 7. Severability. 23 If any portion of this Administrative Code Resolution is determined by any court to be invalid, the invalid portion will be stricken, and such striking will not affect the validity

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of the remainder of this Administrative Code Resolution. If any court determines that this Administrative Code Resolution, in whole or in part, cannot be legally applied to any individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance, such determination will not affect the applicability of this Administrative Code Resolution to any other individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance.

Section 8. <u>Inclusion in the Broward County Administrative Code</u>.

It is the intention of the Board of County Commissioners that the provisions of this Administrative Code Resolution become part of the Broward County Administrative Code as of the effective date. The sections of this Administrative Code Resolution may be renumbered or relettered and the word "resolution" may be changed to "section," "article," or such other appropriate word or phrase to the extent necessary in order to accomplish such intention.

Section 9. <u>Effective Date</u>.

This Administrative Code Resolution is effective upon adoption.
